

**AUTO DEATH ACCIDENTAL, WARNING IS REPEATED**

**Coroner Thomason Finds Robert Henschel Blameless**

**LIGHTS SHOULD BE CARRIED**

**Paul B. Clark Fatality New Lesson to Pedestrians**

Warning given night pedestrians on state roads to carry lights to protect them from being struck by automobiles was repeated by Dr. H. W. Thomason at an inquest at the Court House, Monday, when he found Paul B. Clark, Illon, met accidental death when knocked down by the auto of Robert Henschel, 1101 State Street, while walking the dark highway near Schuyler Saturday night.

Mr. Henschel, who walked immunitarily when sworn, Mr. and Mrs. Fabesyn Jones, 140 North Genesee Street, and Mrs. Catherine Edwards, 2077 Stubaen Street, who were in his car, testified to the blinding glare of approaching autos in the dense holiday traffic and each swore they did not see Mr. Clark walking west at the north side of the road, the same direction traffic was moving.

"The first thing I knew, bang," and Mr. Henschel brought his first together as he testified. Mr. Jones said "we hit something. We stopped and there was a man lying on the road."

**Delayed by Traffic**  
The driver-owner declared he was traveling 15 or 20 miles an hour; that it would be impossible to go faster in the thick traffic and he added, "I must not make any better roadway trying to get the injured man to Decatur Corner."

Other witnesses were Miss Cora Bruggencate, 494 East Main Street, Illon, and Walter East, 81 Lawrence Main Street, Illon. They, with Mr. and Mrs. Clark, rode from Illon to Frankfort and were walking toward Schuyler to get a glimpse of the fatal Kluge meeting Mr. Clark's auto.

They were walking the shoulder of the road close to the paving to single file. Mr. Farley, first, followed by Mrs. Clark, Mr. Bruggencate and Mr. Clark in the rear. According to Mr. Farley, it was Mr. Clark who, a few minutes before the accident, advised his companions to "keep off as far as you can; the autos are coming pretty close."

**Mad Narrow Escape**  
Mrs. Bruggencate said the car struck her, a slight blow on the side as she walked one foot on the paving and she advised Mr. Thomason a small vanity case with a cover bent and mirror broken by the impact.

Dr. David Kidd, who was called by the coroner to No. 10 Engine House, North Utica, said Clark died from fractured skull.

In rendering a decision of accidental death, Dr. Thomason referred to frequent accidents to persons who walk the highways at night without lights. He declared it is often impossible for motorists to see them, especially when following headlights are approaching. Motorists, he said, are required to give warning of their approach by means of headlights and pedestrians, too, should carry lights.
